Prior to the regiment forming in 1972, some of its earliest members belonged to various historical organizations, groups and a rifle range with historical interests including:

The Second Virginia Regiment was originally conceived as a Light Infantry force because of a detachment being assigned to General Anthony Wayne's Light Infantry Corps that successfully stormed the fort at Stony Point on the west side of the Hudson River south of West Point, New York on the night of July 15-16, 1779.

David Jahntz's recollection of his entry into the regiment:

A military collector and storeowner on the far north side of Chicago named "Dirty Eddie" told Jim Nawrocki about the regiment and Jim and Darlene joined in late 1974. Very early in 1975, Jim convinced David Jahntz and Mary Jahntz to visit (as audience) the Tippecanoe National Battlefield living history event (with 1812 and Civil War regiments in attendance) on Memorial Day weekend in 1975. After shooting five rolls of film at that event, David was urged to attend the 200th anniversary of the "Battle of Bunker Hill" event at Madison Heights, Michigan (BAR) in the middle of June. By the mid-summer Moraine Valley Community College event (NWTA) in Palos Hills, Illinois David and Mary had joined the regiment, the Brigade of the American Revolution and the North West Territory Alliance.
